REGULAR MEETING SEPTEMBER 8, 2015

JACOB GARABED ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Harper at 7:30 P.M. Chairperson Harper announced that adequate notice of this meeting has been given to the area press and the Town of Hackettstown, and shall be convened and conducted in accord with the requirements of the Open Public Meetings Act.

Roll call indicated the following members in attendance: Harper, Jerry DiMaio, Kelly and Kuster.

Also attending: Joyce Ma, Court Stenographer Latitisa Russell, Counselor Zaiter, Projects Engineer Klemm, Executive Director Smith and Recording Secretary Palma.

Chairperson Harper led a salute of the United States Flag.

Chairperson Harper stated he would open the meeting for the public hearing to hear testimony and to discuss proposed changes to water and sewer charges.

At this point, Court Stenographer Latitisa Russell sworn in Executive Director Smith. Questions were proposed by Joyce Ma.

Chairperson Harper stated that discussion and possible action to adopt the Water and Sewer Rate Schedules to be the next agenda item.

The following Resolution # 15-3084 was proposed by Kelly who moved its adoption.

WHEREAS, the Hackettstown Municipal Utilities Authority has not increased general water and sewer rates since 2006 and has previously adopted several rate decreases in 1999 and 2002; and,

WHEREAS, during the last several months, the Hackettstown Municipal Utilities Authority has evaluated several different options to develop the proposed rate schedules and has further reviewed comments received regarding the notices published in two newspapers and also forwarded to the municipalities served by the HMUA; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Hackettstown Municipal Utilities Authority hereby adopts the attached Rates and Fees; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Schedule of Water Utility Service Charges and the Schedule of Sewer Utility Service Charges shall become effective with the October 1, 2015 Billing and that all other Fees and Charges shall become effective immediately.

Chairperson Harper indicated that approval of the August 11th Executive Session to be the next agenda item. A motion to approve the minutes was made by Kelly being seconded by Kuster with Harper, Kelly and Kuster voting yea and Jerry DiMaio abstaining.

Chairperson Harper opened the meeting to public participation and noted that there were no additional members of the public present.

Chairperson Harper stated the next agenda item was discussion and possible action regarding any project change orders.

Executive Director Smith acknowledged that there were no change orders.

Chairperson Harper stated that Resolutions pertaining to financial transactions to be the next order of business.

Chairperson Harper requested the Office/Purchasing Supervisor to proceed with her report.

Debbie Palma began by providing the Board with an update on the credit card payments and collections for the month of August.

Debbie concluded by stating that the Authority is now up and running on the new Edmunds billing system. She confirmed that it has been a long process but things are moving along. They performed the first billing with Edmunds on September 1st and it went relatively well. She also stated that the email bills went out a few days later due to the fact that the new website was still not up and running. She also showed the Board the new post card bills and email bills.

Board Member Kelly exited the meeting.

Chairperson Harper requested Executive Director Smith to proceed with his report.

Executive Director Smith began by stating the Auction of the Reservoir Property took place on Saturday August 29th at 10:00 AM here in the Administration Building. He confirmed that there were two bidders and the property sold for \$182,500.00. He stated that he would be meeting the gentleman soon to review documents and answer any questions. The closing is scheduled for October 28th.

Smith concluded by stating that the Edmunds billing system has been a big undertaking for the staff. He stated that compared to the prior WinBill system, the Edmunds system requires many more steps.

Upon completion of the Executive Director's report, Chairperson Harper requested Projects Engineer Klemm to proceed with his report. Engineer Klemm reported that the Delaware River Basin Commission (DRBC) application was finalized on August 12th.will be mailed tomorrow. He also stated that there were two items on



the punch list to be completed for Well #9, which have been completed and final payment has been submitted.

Chairperson Harper requested Counselor Zaiter to proceed with his report.

Counselor Zaiter stated he nothing further to report at this time.

At this time it was suggested that the Board convene into Executive Session.

Chairperson Harper stated he would entertain a motion to convene into Executive Session.

Resolution #15-3086 was proposed by Jerry DiMaio who moved its adoption.

BE IT RESOLVED, on this 8th day of September 2015, by the Hackettstown Municipal Utilities Authority and pursuant to N.J.S.A. 10:4-1 et. Seq., the Authority shall discuss Personnel matters in Executive Session.

It is not possible, at this time, for the Authority to determine when and under what circumstances the above referenced items, which are to be discussed in Executive Session, can be publicly disclosed.

A motion to convene into Executive Session was made by Jerry DiMaio and seconded by Kuster. Ayes: Harper, Jerry DiMaio and Kuster.

Debbie Palma exited the meeting.

Kuster moved to end Executive Session and re-enter Regular Session, said motion being seconded by Jerry DiMaio and all indicating approval at 9:30 PM. No formal action was taken during Executive Session.

Chairperson Harper requested whether anyone had business of a general nature to discuss.

There being no additional comments or discussion, Chairperson Harper declared a motion to adjourn would be in order and was so moved by Jerry DiMaio, seconded by Kuster and followed by a unanimous voice vote.

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1 2 Is there a particular reason 3 the rate is being increased? MR. ZAITER: Mr. Smith is going to 4 5 testify as to why he's recommending that the rates be increased and then if you'd like you can ask him 6 7 questions about it. 8 9 S M I T H, after having been 10 first duly sworn, testified as follows: 11 12 MR. SMITH: The current HMUA rates were 13 adopted in 2006 and at that time the Authority has 14 continued to have a capital plan, at least a 15 five-year capital plan for improvements and one of 16 the things that's occurred since 2006 is the 17 revenue has continuously dropped since then. it could be a combination of the economy. It could 18 19 be a combination of the installation of more 20 low-flow toilets. I'm sure it's partly as a result 21 of efforts to economize by industry that's in our 22 service area. USR Optonix used to be in our 23 service area and are no longer there. 24 revenue has dropped about 400 from the 2006-2007

fiscal year. It was just under \$4 million.

- 1 just now over four-and-a-half million. So it's
- 2 dropped about \$475,000 since that period of time.
- 3 The Authority is incorporated numerous
- 4 or implemented numerous water main replacement
- 5 projects, construction projects for our water
- 6 pollution control plant. There is one currently
- 7 under design and one water main construction
- 8 project under design. The actual income and
- 9 expenses separated by water and sewer have
- 10 continuously reduced. For example, we have total
- 11 operating income that has ranged from,
- 12 approximately, at a peak was about one-and-a-half
- million dollars per year and basically, that money
- 14 can be used toward capital projects.
- The operating income for last year was
- about \$160,000. So that's significantly reduced.
- 17 Investment income was at a peak of about almost
- 18 \$500,000 in 2007. The investment income last year
- 19 was about \$198,000. So that's investment of our
- 20 reserves that are in place.
- 21 CHAIRMAN: What was the operating
- 22 income again you said?
- 23 MR. SMITH: I'm quickly adding the two,
- 24 water and sewer. It was looks like about
- 25 one-and-a-half million. Now that last year's

- operating income was about \$160,000.
- 2 CHAIRMAN: It was one-and-a-half
- 3 million and went to \$160,000 last year.
- 4 MR. SMITH: It's up and down each year
- 5 depending on what happens and this information was
- 6 forwarded to the board. So there are significant
- 7 efforts on our part to replace water mains in many
- 8 cases that are aging. Really cast the iron water
- 9 mains that we're replacing with ductile water
- 10 mains. Last year, we did all of College View
- 11 Drive, College View section and a significant
- 12 portion of Kenwood Village section of Hackettstown.
- 13 Do you have any questions? Anything I missed that
- 14 you can think of?
- 15 MR. ZAITER: You were talking about the
- increase in costs. Are there any other increased
- 17 costs that the Authority has undergone since 2007?
- 18 MR. SMITH: The Authority's operating
- 19 cost has increased since 2007. The Authority has
- 20 not added additional personnel. The budgeted
- 21 personnel are the same that they were at that
- 22 point. So we haven't added anything to that. But
- 23 the actual expenditures for salaries and wages have
- 24 gone up since certainly 2007. Connection fees are
- 25 dropped off because there is lack of development in

- 1 our service area. So that's been reduced. We hit
- 2 a peak of about 2009. It looks like a peak of
- 3 connection fees about \$550,000. Last year, we had
- 4 48, 49,000. So there is significant evidence that
- 5 that we need to generate some additional revenue to
- 6 pay for the capital improvement project that we
- 7 have planned for our future.
- 8 Some of our infrastructure, including
- 9 the water pollution control plan was expanded and
- 10 upgraded in 1993. We're currently waiting a permit
- 11 modification from the DEP and we don't know what
- 12 that holds in store. It's about one million. We
- haven't bid this work for the upgrade for the water
- 14 control plan, the upgrades that were in place
- occurred in 1993 and are now 22-years old. There
- 16 is continuous work and effort to replace pumps,
- 17 upgrade equipment, maintain equipment and again, a
- 18 big part of this increase is related to water and
- 19 really is related to replacing older cast iron
- 20 water mains throughout the HMUA distribution water
- 21 system.
- MR. KUSTER: Also, correct me if I'm
- wrong, the MUA uses money on hand to fund many of
- the improvement projects versus going out to
- 25 bonding anticipation notes or formal bonding,

- 1 correct?
- 2 MR. SMITH: That's absolutely, correct.
- MR. KUSTER: We pay through revenue
- 4 generated for these improvements versus borrowing
- 5 the money, which includes an interest rate on top
- of that. So you're borrowing the money and paying
- 7 the interest on it, also. So it's a much more
- 8 cost-effective way to do business by paying as you
- 9 go if you can afford to do it.
- 10 MR. SMITH: Don't need a bond counsel.
- 11 Don't need to pay interest rates. Our last debt
- 12 service was, I believe, paid off in 2010. I could
- be wrong on that, but the rough dates. So in 1993
- 14 the Authority had -- maybe, it was 2012. So the
- 15 Authority had a 20-year loan with New Jersey
- 16 Environmental Infrastructure Trust and that was
- 17 paid off, I believe, in 2012 or 2011.
- MR. KUSTER: We're pretty much debt
- 19 free as far as owing money to bond holders or banks
- and pretty much self-sufficient.
- 21 MR. SMITH: That's correct. We have
- 22 some debt with the USDA that was related to the
- 23 Diamond Hill projects and that is solely paid for
- 24 by the additional surcharges or charges that are
- applied to the regular bill that's paid for by the

- 1 Diamond Hill area residents. So, basically, that
- 2 burden wasn't based on the regular rate base. It
- 3 was placed on the Diamond Hill customers.
- 4 CHAIRMAN: Bruce, so the income that
- 5 will be seen from the increase from this rate
- 6 increase will bring us back to levels five years
- 7 ago for operating income.
- 8 MR. SMITH: The expected revenue
- 9 generated from the rate increase is, approximately,
- 10 \$520,000 and we're about \$470,000 lower than we
- were in 2007. So it's just getting us back to
- 12 even.
- MR. KUSTER: And comparatively to other
- 14 MUAs of similar sizes, I know you presented to the
- board members, you know, what the quarterly fees,
- 16 yearly fees compared to what the MUA users are
- paying.
- 18 MR. SMITH: A number of customers in
- 19 the area are significantly higher than the HMUA
- 20 rates and charges. If you look at Washington
- 21 Township MUA, Allamuchy Township, those are the two
- 22 closest ones. We're significantly lower than they
- 23 are and I would say that throughout the State of
- New Jersey we're one of the lowest. We have one of
- 25 the lowest water and sewer rates than any agency in

- 1 the State of New Jersey. Any other questions?
- 2 MR. ZAITER: Can you talk about the
- 3 increases? Do you have a list or schedule of
- 4 increases that we can attach as an exhibit to this
- 5 hearing? I know you mentioned about 120,000. Can
- 6 you talk about the increases, themselves?
- 7 MR. SMITH: Sure. One of the things we
- 8 try to do to structure the rates is to increase the
- 9 base charges a little bit to get some guaranteed
- income that would be coming in. Our base charge
- 11 for water was \$14.90, which is less than \$5 a
- 12 month. That's a quarterly charge. That is
- proposed to go up to \$21, which is \$7 a month for
- water, which is the base charge. \$7 per month, \$21
- 15 per quarter and that's for residential single
- 16 family.
- 17 There is a number of changes that were
- 18 published in the Daily Record and the Star Gazette
- 19 that indicate the rates based on the type of class
- of user that we have. So it depends on the size of
- 21 the meter. It depends on how much water you use.
- 22 The water rate schedule continues to discourage as
- 23 much as we can lawn watering by residential
- 24 customers and lawn sprinkling accounts. So it's
- 25 difficult to predict what the amount of additional

- 1 revenue would be and the amount of increase that
- 2 the customer is going to see is largely dependent
- 3 upon how much water they use. So it can vary.
- 4 The typical single family customer
- 5 that's using 20,000 gallons per quarter will see an
- 6 increase of about \$16.10 over the current rate,
- 7 roughly \$5 and some cents per month and that would
- 8 equate to a total increase of about 15.5 percent.
- 9 Sewer increase is lower than the water
- 10 increase.
- MR. ZAITER: Do you have any questions?
- 12 Would you like to ask some questions?
- MS. MA: I want to understand what your
- 14 reserve amount is. You say that you were pretty
- 15 much debt free with the exception of USDA. Is
- there a reserve associated with the accounts?
- 17 MR. SMITH: There is. We have a
- 18 general account. There are certain accounts that
- 19 are required by our bond resolution we are required
- 20 to keep reserves. For example, there is a
- 21 construction aid fund, which is where we put our
- 22 connection fees. That fund is and this is off the
- 23 top of my head. So about 2.3 million, somewhere
- 24 around there, two-and-a-half million dollars.
- 25 There is a rate stabilization fund that's required

- 1 by our bond resolution that has \$750,000 in it.
- 2 There is a renewal and replacement fund that has
- 3 \$50,000. There is a general fund that has about
- 4 \$6.3 million in it for our projects. So as time
- 5 goes on, that number was possibly up around 10 or
- 6 11 million. Maybe, nine. Just off the top of my
- 7 head.
- 8 So the concern would be we don't want
- 9 to let that go down to nothing and then generate --
- and then be required to pay for a construction
- 11 project to generate a large rate increase for our
- 12 customers. So since it's been about nine years now
- 13 since last rate increase, it makes sense as that
- 14 amount has been going down to be able to increase
- 15 the rates a little bit to at least reduce the rate
- of the drop and to possibly increase that a little
- 17 bit.
- MS. MA: Were there any indications
- 19 that you would receive from most revenue from
- 20 certain class of user, whether it's somebody using
- 21 10,000 gallons or 20,000? I notice that 10,000
- 22 seems to be a 50 cents increase. Whereas, the
- 23 separate rates where you have the 10 to 30, 30 to
- 24 60, 90 plus, you dropped that and put ten plus now.
- 25 MR. SMITH: They weren't dropped.

- 1 Basically, the residential rates that were set
- 2 previously were for every gallon that they used up
- 3 to 10,000 gallons, it was only a \$1.10 per 1,000
- 4 gallons. It's increased \$1.60 per 1,000 gallon.
- 5 That partly why the rate was low. So the step
- 6 charges, basically, were 2.20, 3.20, 4.20. They
- 7 were increased by 10,000. Can you give me a
- 8 particular example that you're talking about?
- 9 By the way, there was no effort to dump
- 10 this or to burden this upon any specific class of
- 11 user, but generally to make some rate changes that
- we felt were appropriate.
- 13 MS. MA: I notice that for the first
- 14 10,000, of course, everybody is going to be using
- 15 the \$10,000.
- 16 MR. SMITH: That's not the case. There
- 17 are a lot of customers that use zero. So actually,
- 18 it was a significant amount. I was surprised when
- 19 I really took a look at that.
- 20 MS. MA: Zero, as in they just pay the
- 21 base, the 14.90 and nothing else?
- 22 MR. SMITH: Yes.
- 23 MS. MA: Is that customers who have
- 24 stopped their water or any particular reason?
- 25 MR. SMITH: It could be customers that

- 1 there is a significant number of houses that have
- 2 been vacated. There are probably a lot of
- 3 commercial accounts where they use very little
- 4 water in those commercial accounts. Some people
- 5 will go away for a period of time. So I can't
- 6 think of any really better examples than those, but
- 7 there were a lot. I was surprised.
- 8 MS. MA: Have you ever taken a look at,
- 9 not that that's the case, but we need to stop
- 10 servicing some of those accounts, if possible?
- MR. SMITH: Well, if they don't ask us
- 12 to stop service, we don't stop service. If we stop
- 13 service, we stop revenue.
- 14 MS. MA: So the rates and all those
- miscellaneous fees, that has stayed the same.
- MR. SMITH: Yes.
- MS. MA: Is there a particular reason
- 18 why those haven't increased?
- MR. SMITH: No particular reason. The
- 20 collection charge is \$35. We thought that was
- 21 significant. You know, it's been in place for a
- 22 while.
- 23 MS. MA: Are those inline with the
- other towns in the area, the rates?
- 25 MR. SMITH: I know in one case we are a

- 1 little higher than other towns in collection fees,
- 2 but I really don't know off the top of my head.
- 3 MS. MA: So the increase wouldn't
- 4 expect to be one particular class of user, whether
- 5 it's under 10,000 gallons or above?
- 6 MR. SMITH: No. Under 10,000 gallon --
- 7 well, if you use zero, it goes up about 14.2
- 8 percent. So that's really the minimum of charges
- 9 that go up. It increases 5,000 at 16-and-a-half
- 10 percent. 10,000 is 18.4 percent. 20,000 is 15.5
- and it kind of goes down from there as far as the
- 12 percentages are concerned and yet, the dollar
- amounts go up. So depends on how you look at it.
- 14 If you look at it based on a percentage or based on
- a dollar numbers and then there is some significant
- 16 increases for other classes that include
- 17 commercial, industrial, apartments and some of
- 18 those increases are significant, especially if they
- 19 have a larger-size meter. So I think they are
- 20 spread about the best that we can do, I think.
- 21 MS. MA: Are there any indications and
- 22 I don't know if you would know this, that there are
- going to be new complexes in the area that would
- 24 generate the revenue?
- MR. SMITH: Well, we live in the

- 1 highlands area. So our service area was severely
- 2 cutback by the Highlands Act. There is small
- 3 five-unit development being built down along 46.
- 4 There are five units there. There was the senior
- 5 housing project off of Route 57. There's maybe
- 6 been 100 units that's been built over the last six
- 7 or eight years. There is some project off of
- 8 Belleview Road, which seems to be resurrecting
- 9 itself. That's on the books for a long, long time.
- 10 Originally, it was 28 units. I don't know what
- it's going to be now, but I'm really hearing rumors
- 12 about that one. There is a project on Mountain
- 13 Avenue. There has been some recent discussion, but
- other than that, I really can't think of anything
- 15 else.
- MR. KUSTER: If you look at the Town of
- 17 Hackettstown, the town is probably 98 percent fully
- developed. As far as any new construction
- 19 residential wise, you're going to get individual
- 20 homes being built on possibly some subdivided lots.
- 21 But other than what Bruce has mentioned with some
- of these remaining parcels, the state owns a lot of
- 23 property. Green Acres has come in and purchased
- 24 properties that were scheduled for development,
- 25 300-unit projects. Siegel Morell right now, Green

- 1 Acres came and purchased that.
- 2 Specifically, from the Town of
- 3 Hackettstown, unless zoning changes and we can
- 4 start building 10, 12, 20-story high rises, there
- is not going to be much residential development and
- as Bruce mentioned, the surrounding communities
- 7 particularly hit by, I guess, you know, depends on
- 8 how you look at it, but Highlands Act and the good
- 9 and potentially bad of that, if you want to look at
- 10 it that way, but that impedes development.
- MR. SMITH: There is one other one
- 12 across from Heath Village. They have proposed to
- develop that project over there. The other thing I
- 14 would say and I am not taking a position one way or
- 15 the other, there are rules now with regard to
- 16 proximity to the category one streams. You have to
- 17 be 300 feet away. That land has a small brook
- 18 going through the middle of the project, which is
- 19 impacting that.
- The other thing that I would mention to
- 21 you is that there is a significant focus now, not
- 22 only throughout the country, but in New Jersey with
- 23 regard to asset management and the DEP now requires
- 24 asset management plans for entities such as the
- 25 HMUA. We've had an asset management plan in place

- and we've been monitoring our maintenance of our
- 2 equipment for at least 10, 15 years. This rate
- 3 increase is mainly to ensure that we can continue
- 4 to provide upgrades to our infrastructure. I can
- 5 tell you it's much cheaper to replace and upgrade
- 6 it before it breaks than after it breaks. I've
- 7 seen that firsthand in other entities. So it's a
- 8 very important thing and a very important focus in
- 9 New Jersey that the DEP is now included in all of
- 10 their permitting.
- MS. MA: Is there any thought or
- 12 consideration into doing anything with, like, water
- power or similar to the solar power or water
- 14 generation?
- 15 MR. SMITH: One of the things that we
- 16 took a look at or that someone took a look at for
- 17 us a number of years ago was hydroelectric from our
- 18 water supply reservoirs and that was determined not
- 19 to be feasible because it was not sufficient height
- 20 and not a sufficient amount of water. So the real
- 21 significance of water and power is really reducing
- or are unaccounted for water, which reduces our
- 23 pumping costs. If there is less water wasted into
- the ground from leaky pipes, there's less
- 25 electricity.

- 1 One of the things that we've been
- 2 successful in doing is reducing our electric use
- 3 throughout our utilities. So the HMUA was the
- 4 first public entity that enrolled into the local
- 5 government energy audit program. We received a
- 6 grant to do an energy audit in both the water and
- 7 sewer utilities. We conducted a -- I'm trying to
- 8 think of the name of the program where we
- 9 implemented some of the projects recommended by the
- 10 study to reduce our electricity and the water
- 11 pollution control plant has significantly reduced
- 12 it more than 30 percent. So at the same time,
- we've been using reverse auctions to get
- 14 electricity rates, so our rates continue to go
- down. That's one area where it's been significant
- 16 reduction in our costs and it really has provided
- the necessary funds to delay this rate increase
- 18 from, maybe, what might have been five years to now
- 19 nine years and if you think about it, if it was
- four years ago, it would have been during the peak
- of the crisis that we had here in the U.S. with the
- 22 economy. So we're certainly happy that we didn't
- do it then and that we are able to do it at this
- 24 point instead of back then.
- MS. MA: One more question. You

- 1 mentioned that the expected revenue is the
- 2 \$520,000. Is that expected for the first year or
- over a five-year duration or another duration?
- 4 MR. SMITH: That was using 2014 data
- 5 and prorated for the entire year. So that's what's
- 6 expected. So clearly, it could be a lot less or a
- 7 lot more. It depends on the class of user, how
- 8 much they use. If they continue to use less water,
- 9 then I can see that number going down, but that was
- 10 the best calculation I could do based on a number
- of different classes of user to try to estimate
- 12 what it would be.
- MS. MA: It's just based on the 2014
- 14 numbers versus five-year use data reference for a
- 15 percentage increase growth rate?
- MR. SMITH: I took a look at the
- increase in the minimum charges and I just
- 18 multiplied that by the number of customers and that
- 19 gave me the increase associated with just the
- 20 minimum charges. I took a look at the use charges
- 21 over that year period and tried to prorate that and
- look at what that would be with the new use charges
- 23 and I did a spreadsheet. So the proposed increase
- 24 for water is about 371,000. The increase in sewer
- is about 155,000. So sewer for residential

- 1 customers is a flat rate increase. So for them it
- went from \$56 to \$60. I think Washington Township
- 3 MUA is about 170. I'd be happy to answer any other
- 4 questions you may have.
- 5 MR. ZAITER: Anybody else have any
- 6 questions or testimony they want to add? At this
- 7 point I'd ask that the board vote on the increases.
- 8 The standard that the board should consider is that
- 9 the increase is necessary and reasonable for the
- 10 Authority to pay expenses of operation and
- 11 maintenance of utility, which includes reserves,
- insurance, expansions and replacements. Why don't
- we do it with the sewer authority first?
- 14 MR. SMITH: It's one schedule.
- 15 MR. ZAITER: We can do it with both
- 16 sewer and water. If somebody would like a motion.
- 17 MR. KELLY: I will make that motion
- 18 that we adopt the water and sewer rate schedules
- 19 and revised and distributed to date.
- 20 CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Ed. Do I have a
- 21 second?
- MR. DiMAIO: Second.
- 23 CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Jerry. Can we
- 24 read the roll?
- 25 MR. SMITH: Mr. Harper?
